DONKIN—On Sunday, April 6th, to the wife of Thos. J. Donkin, a son. Mother and child doing well.

He was born in Stockport, England, in the year 1829, and baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, in the year 1843, in Stockport, England. He died in full faith of the Gospel.

The funeral was held in the Fayette Meeting-house on Sunday 29th, ult., and it was largely attended by relatives and friends.

She died in full faith of the Gospel and leaves a husband, a large family and many friends to mourn her loss.

JENKINS.—Margret Jenkins, wife of Wm Jenkins, died at Garden Creek, Marsh Valley Ward, in the Cache Valley Stake of Zion, March 28th, 1884,

Sister Jenkins was born in Wales, July 5th, 1808, embraced the Gospel February, 1847. In 1848 she was stricken down with cholera and her eyes were closed as if in death, but through the administration of the ordinances of the Church she was at once restored to health. She emigrated to Utah in 1856, in Captain Bunker's company of handcarts, suffered greatly from fatigue, hunger and exposure, ministering to the wants of her sick husband and three children, the former of which fell a victim to the hardships encountered on the prairie two days after their arrival in Salt Lake City. Sister Jenkins moved to Provo, where she remained till after the move south, then lived at

Salt Lake for a time. In 1864 she went again to Provo to live with her sons. In 1870 she, in company with her sons, moved to Marsh Valley, where she lived till the time of her death.

She leaves two sons, one daughter and eighteen grand children, who in common with the Saints of this Ward, will feel deeply the bereavement. Sister Jenkins was First Counselor to the President of the Relief Society. She was ever found true to her covenants and died in full faith of a glorious resurrection beyond the grave.—COM.
